



Child Care Subsidy Forms Going On-Line

In a few months you will be able to submit your Child Care Subsidy claim forms online as long as you are already claiming your Child Care Operating Fund (CCOF) on line.

We reported earlier that CCOF as of June 1st, 2014 would only be accepting claims forms online and now the trial period of the subsidy forms online is coming to a close so that the new system will be launched across the province very soon.

These are the instructions on how to enter the portal once it is up and operational for everyone to use. Take the time to familiarise yourself with the instructions so that you will be ready to join the online portal once the portal is up and running for the full province.

As you can see by the instructions, that it is very similar to the CCOF portal where you will be able to go online and see if your claim has been accepted, approved or paid out and on what dates. I was part of the trial portion of the portal for a short time and I can say from experience that it is a great way to submit your forms and know that they have been received (you can print off a statement) instead of wondering if it got lost in the mail or did my fax really get to the office?

Reminder that you can sign up for email notification of your direct deposits of the CCOF and/or Subsidy payments which is another great option available for providers as the emails come at least three days in advance of the direct deposit date and you will know exactly when your payment will arrive instead of waiting for the envelope to come via regular mail.

Childcare 2020

On November 12, 2014 I stepped onto a plane headed to the first National Child Care Conference in over ten years! I attended this training because as a Director of BC Family Child Care Association, I sit as a representative on the Canadian Child Care Federation Member Council. This is my perspective of the events of the Canadian Child Care 2020 Conference held in Winnipeg November 12th-15th, 2014.



I attended a Canadian Child Care Federation meeting, my first ever face to face with this amazing group! It was so beneficial to meet everyone in person, I have always attended these meetings via webinar. The value in meeting face to face made everyone's reports so much more meaningful, and created bonds that would otherwise have taken longer with the online forum

Families desperately need access to early childhood education and child care. The conference was named *Child Care 2020* because of the vision for a national Early Childhood Education system in place by the year 2020. The opening ceremonies consisted of Kathleen Wynne, Premier of Ontario, and she spoke passionately about the importance of child care, calling on all federal governments to declare their platform on child care.

This was followed by presentations on what's happening in child care by representatives from every province, from the west coast to east coast. Then a panel consisting of the honourable Carolyn Bennett, Liberal Member of Parliament from St. Pauls, Ontario and Jinny Sims, NDP Member of Parliament from Delta BC, answered questions from the audience on a national child care plan. Both parties support a national child care system for Canada.

The plan would need to support quality child care and the Canadian Child Care Federation has identified nine elements believed to be crucial to early childhood education:

- 1) Leadership at program level
- 2) Collaborative relationship with families
- 3) Indoor and outdoor physical and learning environments that promote health, safety and development
- 4) A purposeful program that promotes children's development
- 5) An Early Learning Child Care environment that supports the Rights of the Child
- 6) A supported workforce
- 7) Knowledgeable, skilled practitioners
- 8) Professional administrative practices
- 9) Effective system infrastructure





Economist, Pierre Fortin's speech (Professor of Economics at the University of Québec at Montréal, and a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada), opened our eyes to the financial benefits realized in Quebec by their \$7 a day child care system; 70,000 more women in the work force = more taxes and consumption tax paid. This added 5 Billion to the GDP (Gross Domestic Product, one of the primary indicators used to gauge the health of a country's economy) and there was 900 million on net, more than the old system. For every dollar invested Ottawa pockets .55 cents and Quebec .20 cents, on net. In addition, they have seen 60% less people on welfare. Although there are controversial statements to be found on this topic, the bottom line is, a child care system supported by Governments, contributes to the health of children, families and the Country.

I attended a variety of sessions, one was on moving from child care as a market commodity to child care as a system! The short answer to this is we are all going to need to work together instead of independently. In fact, the overall conference was amazing, to see child care providers, not for profit organizations, government representatives, unions, corporations, and interested citizens pulling together to support the creation of a National Child Care System! Why, because they all recognize the monumental importance of proper care for children and the impact on families and communities.



Stress Management

A lecturer, when explaining stress management to an audience, raised a glass of water and asked, "how heavy is this glass of water?" Answers called out ranged from 20g to 500g. The lecturer replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long you try to hold it."

- If you lend someone \$20 and never see that person again, it was probably worth it.
- It may be that your sole purpose in life is simply to serve as a warning to others.
- Never buy a car you can't push.
- Never put both feet in your mouth at the same time, because then you won't have a leg to stand on.
- Nobody cares if you can't dance well. Just get up and dance.
- Since it's the early worm that gets eaten by the bird, sleep late.
- The second mouse gets the cheese.
- When everything is coming your way, you're in the wrong lane.
- Birthdays are good for you. The more you have, the longer you live.
- You may be only one person in the world, but you may also be the world to one person.
- Some mistakes are too much fun to only make once.
- We could learn a lot from crayons. Some are sharp, some are pretty and some are dull. Some have weird names, and all are different colors, but they all have to live in the same box.
